That's why United Way and our community partners have launched Learn United, a 10-year initiative to ensure all local children can read at grade level by the end of third grade.

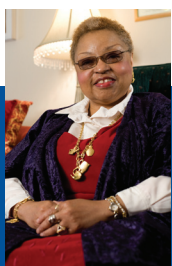

2-1-1 is an easy-to-remember three-digit phone number that provides residents of 10 area counties with information about more than 2,000 northeast Indiana government, non-profit and community services. Last year, 2-1-1 answered more than 40,000 calls. 2-1-1:

- Helps connect individuals in need to social service agencies;
- Helps agencies share information;
- Creates efficiencies by relieving agency staff of some incoming phone calls/inquiries;
- Assists in disasters by taking non-emergency phone calls and relieving the burden on 911;
- Tracks social service/client needs of the entire community; and
- Reports gaps in services/unmet needs in the community.

Local senior citizen Sandra White is disabled and on a limited income, but she maintains her independence with help from United Way partner agencies that provide transportation to places like the grocery and the doctor.
